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Glo Hard or Glo Home

Gamma Upsilon Chapter at SVSU

For the past three years, Alpha Kappa Lambda has brought Glo Hard to campus at Saginaw Valley State University. The now annual event is the culmination of work between AKL, SVSU, and other Registered Student Organizations to create an event that encourages safe partying and offers a fun start to the school year.

"We were the organization that reached out to Glo Hard [Michiganbased Black Light paint party promoter] first and then worked with them and Student Life at SVSU to get the funds and make the event happen" says Chapter President Jaemes Chouinard. "Overall, Glo Hard is a safe/alternative party event for students on campus to enjoy and meet other students at SVSU."

Attendees receive white shirts and paint is available for purchase to throw on themselves and at friends. Glo Hard also brings together some of Michigan's best DJs while volunteers keep the energy going with foam and paint being sprayed across the lot. Jaemes said his first goal was to have the event run as smoothly as it has in the past and continue to grow the event. "I prepared by setting up a timeline of deadlines for myself to make sure everything was taken care of before the event."

"To pull off an event this big, allocations are crucial. So submitting allocation forms, meeting with sponsors, and making a budget are all very important," he said. "I also had to make graphics for the event, event pages on social media, and T-shirt designs."

In addition to planning the event, marketing and advertising is crucial to a successful turnout. Marketing and Public Relations Chairman Jarrett Markley said "My process for planning and scheduling posts for the event has changed quite a bit over the years as the event has grown."

them saved to Hootsuite so that I wasn't rushing last minute to put everything together. Knowing our audience on each platform has helped out quite a bit, so, for example, creating an event on Facebook was all we needed for that platform, while we focused mainly on posting to Instagram, as that's where our target audience is."

This year, attendance was just shy of 800. The event ran for around two hours, with students lining up 45 minutes prior to the event, and raised over \$200 that was donated to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation.

When asked about the importance of Glo Hard, Jaemes explained "The importance of Glo Hard is to help give students fun events and alternatives to going out and getting into trouble. We also provide alcohol education tips on the back of the event shirts. Bringing the campus together is always a goal for an event like this."

"We see the impact of Glo Hard everywhere" said Jarrett. "We've only been putting the event on for three years now and it's already one of the largest events on our campus. You can hardly go a day without seeing someone wear their Glo Hard shirt on campus, so seeing that helps us know that this event has had quite an impact on everyone."

Jarrett continued, "Glo Hard isn't just an event we put on just to put on. It's main purpose is to not only help the incoming class have a smoother transition to college life, but to also promote smart partying tips along with alcohol safety so that the attendees can feel and act safe when encountering those environments."

Jaemes added "My favorite part of Glo Hard is seeing how much fun everyone has during the event, and knowing that Alpha Kappa Lambda is making a difference on campus. I'm looking forward to the event growing more, by getting more attendees and students to come out."



Remembering_

Brother William "Bill" Porter

William "Bill" Porter, 76, died of natural

causes on August 14, 2019. He was born on May 14, 1943 in Flagstaff, Arizona, and grew up in Kingman after his family moved there when he was 12 years old. He graduated from Mohave Union High School (now Kingman High) in 1961 and went on to enroll at the University of Arizona.

Bill earned both a bachelor's degree (1965) and a law degree (1968) as well as held leadership positions in many councils, committees, and organizations on campus at the University of Arizona.

One of those organizations was the Alpha Beta Chapter of Alpha Kappa Lambda which Bill joined in1963, and served as Chapter President.

After graduation and passing the Arizona Bar Examination, Bill entered the Army as a Judge Advocate General (JAG), was a Vietnam veteran (Bronze Star Medal recipient) and a military judge from 1969 to 1976. He returned to Kingman after leaving the service and established his legal practice where he practiced law until his death. Bill married his college sweetheart, June Dippel, and they subsequently had four children: Victoria, David, Alexandra and Tammy.

His involvement in the fraternity continued throughout his life, volunteering at local and national levels. When Alpha Beta Chapter at the University of Arizona was rechartered in 1986, a call was put out for alumni support. Bill came forward to volunteer his time and skills for his alma mater. His impact at a local level led him to join the National Executive Council as National President.

During his time as National President from 1993 to 1998, Bill visited every active chapter at his own expense. Traveling by car, train, plane, and even canoe and usually with only a carry-on bag for luggage.

In addition to chapter visits, he was fundamental in several Chartering and Initiation ceremonies. Including the currently active chapters Gamma Beta Chapter at the University of Alabama (1993,) Gamma Gamma Chapter at Rutgers State University (1995,) and Gamma Delta Chapter at the University of Montevallo (1995.)

As National President, Bill attended and participated in numerous National Conclaves. He was inducted and joined the National Executive Council at the 1993 National Conclave in Kansas City, Missouri. And gave a moving farewell speech after stepping down as National President at the 1998 National Conclave in Snowmass, Colorado.

Throughout his lifetime, Bill was very generous to the AKL Education Foundation and served on the Board of Directors as a volunteer.

Excerpt from Brother Porter's Farewell Speech as National President

Five years ago I embarked on a journey. A quest, really. I was looking for a definition. An explanation. A description. What is this thing called AKL?

I began to sense a spirit out there. Something not quite touchable. It has pride. It has heart. It has deep feelings. It has courage. It has longevity. It has loyalty. It can flourish on any campus across this nation where young men with values, seeking to be better and more successful, and seeking friendship gather to make it work.

This thing called AKL is a man. It is you. You are the spirit I was seeking That manifests itself in every act of love, encouragement or kindness of brothers.

It appears in those tiring, uplifting hours at a philanthropy with your brother at your side, being the men you know you should be. It appears in your screams of support and joy for another brother on the athletic field or in the political hustlings.

It's in the silly practical jokes. The road trips. The all-night talks in which you solve the problems of the universe. It shows in the tears when you share the pain. The enfolding arms when things get too hard to bear alone.

It is in the pride of doing ritual well so that the new brother starts his membership on the glorious high note intended by the founders. It is in attendance at chapter and the friendship and verbal jousting that occurs there.

It is in the pride and devotion in giving of your over-stretched time and threatening your own grades to serve as a chapter officer. It is in listening to the words of the creed when you say them and meaning them. "You will be missed, but I know you'll welcome us to the Omega Chapter when our times come. You arrived at the Beta Upsilon house when we needed you the most. You taught us we were Men of Character Committed to Making a Difference, and I will always be grateful for this."

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Beta Phi Chapter at Auburn University

With his background in Higher Education and Student Involvement, Caleb Rotton, Beta Phi Chapter at Auburn University, currently works as an Academic Support Specialist at The University of Alabama at Birmingham School of Medicine. InsideAKL sat down with Caleb to learn more about the experiences that brought him to where he is now.

What officer roles did you hold or how did you get involved with your chapter?

"I held the officer roles of Recruitment Chairman and Academic Chairman. I started on the Recruitment Committee helping the recruitment chairman in the year after my initiation. I took over for him after that year and ended my time as the Academic Chairman."

Were you involved on campus?

"I was heavily involved at Auburn starting as a freshman. I was a Parent Counselor for Camp War Eagle (new student orientation), then a Student Counselor the following summer. I was an Ambassador for the College of Liberal Arts, eventually becoming the President of that organization. I did a variety of jobs and volunteer roles for the College of Liberal Arts and for the university's Academic Support Center."

What did you do after graduating undergrad?

"I worked briefly in insurance sales before going back to Auburn for grad school. I knew from my involvement experiences that I wanted to go into Higher Education to work with college students. I got that opportunity and enjoyed working with students for two years while doing graduate coursework."

How has you career path grown and changed since then?

"After finishing up my master's program, I was lucky to work at AKL National Headquarters for a year as a Chapter Consultant. Traveling

around the Southeast and Midwest was an incredible experience. Getting to meet undergraduate brothers and alumni from a variety of chapters gave me a much broader understanding of our brotherhood and the impact the organization has across the country."

"After spending 7 years at Auburn and a year working at AKL, I was ready to put roots in a new place. I got an opportunity to be a Coordinator of Student Activities at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. It was a fun and fast 3 years! I learned a lot of great skills as an event planner."

"I moved two years ago to my current job as an Academic Support Specialist for the UAB School of Medicine. It's been really rewarding helping medical students fulfill their dream of becoming a doctor."

Tell us about your family and home life?

"I grew up in a rural county of Alabama that is southeast of Montgomery and southwest of Auburn. My dad was a dairy farmer, then in the Alabama Air National Guard. My mom was a banker, but retired to take care of my brother and me. She home-schooled us for a while before sending us to a small private school outside of Montgomery."

"After college and moving to Birmingham, I met Elizabeth. She went to Auburn the same time as I did, but we never met. It's funny how life works. She went to UA for law school and is a practicing attorney. We got married two years ago and spend our days giving our dog the best life possible. Seriously, Bonnie has 2 beds, 3 blankets, and a bin full of toys she rarely uses. I need to change her name at the Vet to Bonnie Spoiled Rotton."

What is your fondest AKL memory?

"My fondest memories of AKL mostly surround preparing for Initiation and being with newly initiated brothers. This goes for my own initiation and for the ones that came after."

How have you kept in touch with brothers over the years?

"Two of my chapter brothers were in my wedding. There are several in Birmingham that I see regularly and others scattered across the country that I get to see less often, but I make a point to see them on road trips and going back to campus for games. I met so many great people in college outside of AKL, but it is my brothers that I know I will keep up with for the rest of my days."

How does being an undergraduate member differ/ compare to being an alumni member of AKL?

"I do miss being an undergraduate member and seeing my brothers regularly. I wish that more alumni would be active in the life of the fraternity. Your fraternity membership in AKL doesn't stop at graduation and neither should your involvement."

"When I worked in the Student Involvement office at UAB, a lot of the activities involved Greek Life. I gained a tremendous respect for NPHC organizations for a lot of reasons, but one is how active their alumni are in the organization. I'm envious. I wish that IFC groups had active, city based



Alumni groups. I would love to be a part of a Birmingham Alumni group of AKL brothers."

If you could go back, what's one piece of advice you'd share with your undergraduate self?

"The biggest resource you have is time. Do not waste it chasing meaningless titles or becoming "Big Man on Campus". Those fade so quickly. Invest it instead into experiences, education, mentors, and good friends. Those are what transform and support your development as a leader and a decent human being."

Looking back, what's one piece of advice you received during

your undergraduate years that you've carried with you?

"I am paraphrasing some wisdom from one of my mentors at Auburn: 'There is no real learning or growth without discomfort.' Related to this piece of wisdom is a quote from Robert Kiyosak: 'Inside of every problem lies an opportunity.'"

FRATERNITY RECRUITMENT

Recruitment is the lifeblood of fraternity.

Involving New Members & Building a Wishlist

Your chapter spent all summer planning recruitment. The beginning of the semester every brother met potential new members and built a wishlist of PNMs to invite to recruitment events. Your chapter completed recruitment week ending with extending bids to the PNMs you wanted to join your brotherhood. New members accepted their bids, have been added online to the chapter roster, and have begun or completed their membership entry process and are ready to become initiated brothers.

Now what?

First of all, congratulate yourself and your members for a successful recruitment! Celebrate your new members' initiation into the fraternity and welcome them into the brotherhood! Whether you reached your recruitment minimum goal or are striving for a few more new members, every chapter should involve their new members in recruitment. Like a good business, fraternity chapters should be recruiting 365 days a year. This doesn't necessarily giving out bids every day or holding Initiation every week. But it does mean that you keep a wishlist of PNMs you can invite out to open chapter and brotherhood events to get to know them and potentially give out a bid later in the semester or next semester.

Your new members are a great source of names for this wishlist. They are more than likely younger and know more underclassmen. They are excited to participate in chapter activities and be a part of recruitment. They can be your new salesmen for joining a fraternity by sharing their experiences and excitement for brotherhood with the chapter.

While your chapter may have completed this exercise prior to recruitment, it's beneficial to facilitate it again with new members. Aim for one or two names per each new member.

1) Prepare a Wishlist

The officer facilitating the exercise should have an electronic spreadsheet to update after with names generated that can be shared to the chapter after. On the spreadsheet you want columns for PNM names, contact information, and brother who knows them best. As PNMs attend events more information can be added including class, major, interests, etc.

2) Collect Names

Have members take out their phones and go through contact list, social media, messaging apps, and write down the names of all men who attend your university, are not in another fraternity, and are a possible good fit with AKL.

3) Ask Prompting Questions

As names start to slow down, help jog members' memories and ask "Who's the funniest guy you know? Who do you always see at the gym/library/school cafeteria? Who's the guy in your dorm or apartment you always run into?"

4) Collect Names

And go over a few. Ask brothers if they've invited people on their list to events? What events would make them come out? Why do you think he'd be a good fit? After getting members to think about their PNMs, have everyone invite their lists to an already scheduled recruitment or open brotherhood event.

5) Ask for Referrals

If you want to take it a step further, have members ask their friends in sororities for men they know who are interested in learning more about fraternity life. Ask officers and other members of clubs you're in for referrals.

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RISK MANAGEMENT Brotherly Bonding

Find new ways to engage members

From year to year, it may feel like your chapter is repeating the same brotherhood events. While building tradition is important and unique to every campus, chapters may also find benefit from trying something new. Here area few ideas to engage initiated brothers and new members from our insurance partners at Holmes Murphy's list of <u>"101 Non-Hazing Activities for New Members."</u>

- Host a father's/mother's/family & friends weekend.
- Ask a representative from the National Headquarters and/or advisor to provide a presentation or information on available programs and resources.
- Host a discussion on the finances of the chapter and the breakdown of each expense, facilitating conversation on the dues to the IFC/Greek Council and National Headquarters.
- Attend/host a IFC/PHC/NPCH/ NAFO or Greek Council meeting.
- Participate in Greek community sponsored events (athletic events, speakers, and philanthropy projects.)

- Review parliamentary procedure, its purpose, and necessary areas of use in chapter operations.
- Work with University/College involvement/leadership programming to develop a presentation and discussion on motivation and group dynamics.
- Host/sponsor a presentation from the University/College alumni association and/or Foundation to encourage involvement in host institution after graduation.
- Host a certified instructor to administer a leadership style or personality inventory.
- Ask a faculty member or University/ College staff to provide a

presentation on ethical decision making.

- Ask a faculty member or University/ College staff to provide a presentation/discussion on diversity.
- Host/sponsor a campus health educator to provide a presentation on suicide, eating disorders, depression, sexual assault, and other health issues.
- Create and execute an alumni pen pal or writing campaign among the members.
- Discuss risk management liability with the University/College legal counsel.
- Brainstorm new methods of positive recruitment and education.
- Host an all campus/community event to "meet the members."
- Encourage new members to play on the chapter intramural teams.

- Schedule a weekend each season devoted to the maintenance and up keep on internal and external facilities, invite parents and alumni to help.
- Develop an academic incentive program for new members and the entire chapter membership.
- Conduct regular round-table, candlelight, gavel pass ceremonies.
- Host/sponsor a speaker on the history of the Greek organizations.
- Brainstorm new methods for improving scholarship performance of members.
- Attend a campus performance or athletic event chosen by the new member class
