These Hands Don't Hurt

Alpha Kappa Lambda Supports Sexual Assault Awareness Month

Even before its official declaration, Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) was about both awareness and prevention of sexual assault, harassment, and abuse. Looking at the history of the movement to end sexual violence, it's clear why.

It's impossible to prevent an issue no one knows about, and it's difficult to make people aware of a problem without providing a solution. The two work in tandem, and they always have. From the civil rights movement to the founding of the first rape crisis centers to national legislation and beyond, the roots of SAAM run deep.

Alpha Kappa Lambda recognizes that sexual assault is a serious problem on college campuses and believes that it can be fought through education, service, and philanthropic projects.

The first These Hands Don't Hurt event was held in the mid 90's at the Beta Zeta Chapter at East Tennessee State. The event was quickly adopted by the National Fraternity and was

officially established as AKL's National Philanthropy in 1996. Since then, chapters have tailored the event to their campuses and communities, finding creative ways to offer support. The hallmark of These Hands Don't Hurt is the "Promise Wall."

While a Promise Wall can take many physical forms, the fundamental idea of the Promise Wall is that advocates take the pledge against domestic violence and sexual assault by pledging their hands will not be used to harm another.

Advocates can take the pledge and physically add their "hand" to the Promise Wall in a number of ways. Paper hands can be traced and cut out prior, where advocates add their signature or words of support before attaching to the wall. If your campus allows washable paint, hands can be painted and stamped onto the Promise Wall. Pro-tip: have latex gloves and wet wipes on hand for easier clean-up.

A Promise Wall should be displayed on campus or in the community. It can



be part of an existing structure such as a wall or window in a public building on campus. Or a free-standing wall constructed by the chapter with materials like ply-board. Other options include banners, posters, or tri-folds that are transported easier.

In addition to a Promise Wall, chapters should focus on awareness, volunteering, and donating funds.

Chapters should include education with their Promise Wall by having literature/resources available. It's not always about raising the funds for a big check but starting the conversation and having correct information to share. Spread the word, encourage others to take the pledge.

Service events can be done by volunteering at a shelter, hotline, or other organization that needs hands-

on assistance. Contact your campus health/wellness center to see if they have any upcoming events they need volunteers for. It may not always be the most glamorous role, but they need assistance in promoting, setting up, and running events.

While service is about donating your time, philanthropy is about raising funds. Donations can be collected in exchange for adding a handprint to the Promise Wall or as an optional contribution to their participation. Or partner with a local business to start a fundraiser. Be transparent with where money collected will be donated. Contact the organization you intend to donate to and invite a speaker or representative to your event.

These Hands Don't Hurt does not end with April. Continue to support survivors and give back all year long.

Gamma Lambda Chapter at Temple University began Sexual Assault Awareness Month with a These Hands Don't Hurt Promise Wall and THDH Pledge! Throughout the month of April they continued to fundraise for WOAR, the Philadelphia Center Against Sexual Violence.

For our undergraduate members and chapters, our attention must turn to the opportunity Fall 2021 will bring us. We have the potential to invite a record number of new members into Alpha Kappa Lambda, as we project higher than normal numbers interested in joining a fraternity.

There are various reasons for this projection, most of them stemming from COVID. First there is the potential for more sophomores and upperclassmen looking to join a brotherhood after this past year of social distancing and a constantly changing collegiate environment.

Second there will be excitement to return to at least somewhat normal circumstances. The Fraternity of Alpha Kappa Lambda continues to remain

We must capitalize on this opportunity. One thing we cannot do is get in our own way in this process. The opportunity and the ability are there. It is up to us as an organization and you as active undergraduate members to seize this opportunity.

To help provide resources in preparing for this fall, Evan Ridenour, AKL National Headquarters Coordinator of Growth, will be running a Recruitment Workshop spaced out over summer break.

These workshops are available to all undergraduate members, with a heavy emphasis directed to Recruitment Chairs and their Executive Boards. "I want to stress that things will be more

business as usual than they have been in a year and a half." said Evan about the goal these workshops will take.

"I also want to mention, this is not just for Recruitment Chairs; this opportunity is open to any actives who feel the need to take this opportunity. If your chapter did not meet their recruitment minimums for this past year, I strongly encourage your chapter's Recruitment Chair and Executive Board to participate."

In a year that has forced us to rethink the way we do recruitment, and fraternity in general, it is important to remember the ways we have been forced to adapt are still based on the

ways we have always done things. "I encourage you to continue to improve your recruitment practices." said Evan. "Utilize what you have learned over the past year to your advantage, but do not feel the need to reinvent the wheel either."


Congratulations to all recent graduates! Your hard work has paid off and this transition from undergraduate to alumni member is an exciting time!

AKA 101

Membership Badges & Insignia



The Official Membership Badge of the Fraternity is made of ten carat gold and is set with eleven whole pearls. Among other values, the eleven pearls represent the original founders of Los Amigos Club.

The badge is worn only on shirts, sweaters, or suit vests, and in the traditional position over the heart. The badge can be ordered through the National Headquarters and only by initiated members of the Fraternity. We should wear our badge with pride.

Upon the receipt of the initiate's initiation fee, the National Headquarters will order an official gold badge and a membership certificate to be issued upon official notification of his initiation. These will serve as a visual sign of his membership in the Fraternity.



The AKL Provisional Chapter Pin is like the pledge pin in appearance but has the gold letters "AKL" on its face. This pin is worn by AKL provisional chapter members until the chartering as a chapter.



The AKL Fifty Year Pin is presented to those members with fifty years of membership in the Fraternity of Alpha Kappa Lambda.

A reminder that brotherhood in Alpha Kappa Lambda really is "Affiliation Kindled for Life!"



Chapters may also order a Twenty-five Year Pins to present to alumni reaching this membership milestone.

Incentives & Surcharges

- 10% National Membership Dues increase for Spring 2022 semester for chapters 10% below their Fall recruitment minimum. (increase of \$10.50)
- 10% National Membership Dues decrease for Spring 2022 semester for chapters 10% above their Fall recruitment minimum. (decrease of \$10.50)
- 10% National Membership Dues increase for chapters out of compliance. This is a failure to complete compliance requests and/or semesterly Risk Management Report. (increase of \$10.50)
- 10% surcharge on National Insurance for chapters that had a Risk Management violation the previous semester. (increase of \$11.00)

National Membership Entry Fee

This is a one-time National Membership Entry Fee to join the Fraternity of Alpha Kappa Lambda. The National Membership Entry Fee must be paid in full along with the National Dues within 30 days of joining. Full or partial payment of all charges prior to Initiation Ceremony is strongly encouraged. While individual new members are responsible for paying their balance, the chapter is responsible for making sure the Membership Entry Fee and National Dues are paid in full. If a member drops or is removed from the roster, the chapter is still responsible for making sure that individual pays, otherwise it is the responsibility of the chapter.

Educational Programming Fee

Previously the Meetings Fee, the Educational Programming Fee serves the same purpose and is billed once a year and is to be collected from every man on the roster. Billing occurs in January. The Educational Programming Fee must be paid along with the National Dues & National Insurance within 15 days of the start of the semester.

National Membership Dues

The National Dues are billed twice a year and are to be collected from every man on the roster. Billing occurs in August and January. The National Dues must be paid along with National Insurance within 15 days the start of the semester.

National Insurance

The National Liability Insurance is billed twice a year and is to be collected from every man on the roster. Billing occurs in August and January. The National Insurance must be paid along with National Dues within 15 days the start of the semester.

AKL Risk Management Guidelines: Sexual Abuse and Harassment

An organization should not tolerate or condone any form of sexist or sexually abusive behavior on the part of its members, whether physical, mental, or emotional. This is to include any actions, activities, or events, whether on chapter premises or an off-site location which are demeaning to women or men, including but not limited to verbal harassment, sexual assault by individuals or members acting together. The employment or use of strippers, exotic dancers or similar, whether professional or amateur, at a fraternity event as defined in this policy should not be allowed.

What is Sexual Abuse?

To understand sexual abuse, we must define sexual harassment and rape or sexual assault.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT: is defined as the unwelcome, unreciprocated imposition of sexual attention, usually in the context of a relationship of unequal power.

SEXUAL ASSAULT (or conduct or rape): is defined as an act of sexual contact or penetration with a person against his/her will.

There are many types of sexual abuse. Recognize that sexually abusive behavior occurs on a continuum ranging from harassment to rape.

Verbal abuse or sexist behavior may include:

- 1) Whistling, yelling, taunting.
- 2) Humor and jokes about sex or male or female specific traits.
- 3) Suggestive or insulting sounds.
- 4) Sexual innuendoes about your or someone else's personal appearance.
- 5) Sexual innuendoes about your or someone else's sexual activities; and
- 6) Demands for sexual favors accompanied by implied or overt threats

Physical abuse may include:

- 1) Any inappropriate touching, pinching, or patting.
- 2) Brushing against someone else's body.
- 3) Coerced sexual intercourse; and
- 4) Assault



Why Does Sexual Abuse Occur?

Although there is not one direct cause for sexually abusive behavior, there are some factors that help build an environment conducive to sexual abuse. Factors such as gender role stereotyping - what our society says is "feminine" and "masculine" - are part of the problem leading to rape and sexual harassment.

This social environment that encourages males to be aggressive and females to be passive is ripe for sexual abuse. Sexual harassment and rape are issues of power abuse. If we can understand how gender role stereotyping often leads to power imbalances, we can better understand how the phenomenon of sexual abuse happens in our society.

Alpha Kappa Lambda Risk Management Best Practices

- 1) A chapter will not tolerate or condone any form of sexist or sexually abusive behavior on the part of its members, whether physical, mental, or emotional. This is to include any actions that are demeaning to men or women, ranging from assault to harassment or the objectification of individuals.
- 2) A chapter will not sponsor or participate in any activity, including competitive games, community service or philanthropic endeavors, activities associated with recruitment, social events, or events related to activities such as homecoming that are abusive or demeaning.
- 3) A chapter will educate its members on these issues each year.

Summer Break Safety

Summer break, or the months of May through August, is a high risk period of time for chapter houses. It is important you take the time to properly prepare your chapter house for the summer break period. The leading risks to a chapter facility during the summer break period are:

Fire	Vandalism	Theft
Wind	Water Damage	Hail

Only two perils on the list are truly unavoidable, that being wind and hail. However, the risks and resulting claims from wind and hail often occur to the roof and structure of the facility, emphasizing the need to have the facility inspected by a professional on a regular basis.

Most incidents involving water damage could have been minimal if someone had taken the time to prepare the house for break. The plumbing issues creating damage often went unchecked for days, weeks and even months. As a result, what would have been a few hundred dollars in clean up and a small plumbing repair turned into a costly claim.

Avoiding a claim can make a significant difference in the cost of property

insurance and ability to provide a safe and healthy environment for undergraduate members.

The benefits of preparing your house for summer break include:

- Avoid the expense and the time associated with a claim and restoring the damaged area.
- With a large loss, you may risk having an uninhabitable house for the fall semester.
- Water damage can lead to mold
- Many insurance policies limit coverage in this area.
- Protect your history from thieves and vandals, A price cannot be put on sentimental value

Use the Summer Break Checklist to help prepare your chapter facility!

Summer Break Checklist

- Inspect all rooms, document damage and deduct from security deposit
- Complete routine maintenance on furnace/boiler/AC
- Clean and inspect all roof drains and gutters (contact a local professional)
- Repair all broken windows and doors to prevent damage from inclement weather; ensure that doors latch completely
- Have a roofing contractor inspect the roof, provide a written recommendation, and repair any immediate concerns
- Contact emergency service company to conduct an inspection and service emergency lighting, alarm equipment, fires suppression and sprinkler systems
- Clean exterior and interior of chapter house and check security/safety lighting
- Clean/service fireplace and chimney and check for defects or debris
- Inspect the hot water heater and exposed water lines and pipes for slow leaks
- Remove and dispose of debris outside the facility, especially near the dumpster
- Unplug and store unused appliances
- Service and clean stoves, ovens, hood ranges and other kitchen equipment
- Inform the host institution (college/university) as to whether the residence will be occupied or not and provide proper contact information for the facility

If the chapter facility is unoccupied over the summer:

- Securely lock the property and limit access to only designated caretakers
- Have a responsible alumnus, undergraduate or professional property management company check the property daily to ensure a loss has not occurred. A consistent daily presence will deter thieves and vandals.
- Inform local police and/or campus security the property will not be occupied. Provide them with access to the facility and ask them to patrol frequently
- If it will not affect the function of your fire sprinkler system or other systems, turn the water off at the main supply line (contact a professional for this service)
- When not in use, remove all hoses and store preferably inside facility
- Hire a mature caretaker to reside in and look after the property in exchange for free/reduced rent if a house mother and/or resident advisor is not available
