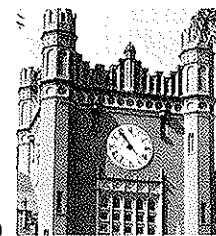

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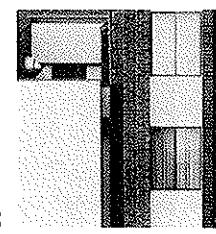

UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS, EL PASO

Alpha Rho Chapter was officially installed at The University of Texas at El Paso on November 19, 1967. The chartering ceremonies culminated two years effort by members of the El Paso AKL Colony.

The colony started in September, 1965 when Carl Zaiss, an AKL from Kansas State Teachers, transferred to UTEP and organized an initial group of nine men. They soon grew to 24 and began active participation in fraternity and campus affairs. Among the colony's earlier accomplishments were a second place in fraternity scholarship among nine fraternities and a second in the campus homecoming float competition. Under the leadership of Frank Ivy and Lee Cain the members developed a full fraternity program based on the ideals of Alpha Kappa Lambda. The colony was represented by men in many campus organizations and all branches of student government.

The University

The University of Texas at El Paso was founded 54 years ago as the Texas School of Mines. A liberal arts curriculum was added in 1931, and in 1949 the name of the institution was changed to Texas Western College of The University of Texas. UTEP today enrolls over 8,200 students in many academic fields. The university has had a rapid growth, which is evidenced in considerable new construction on campus to keep pace with the increasing demands for facilities. The El Paso campus is the home of the Sun Bowl stadium where the annual Sun Bowl football game is played.

There are seven national fraternities and one local at UTEP. The system's other national chapters are Phi Kappa Tau, Sigma Alpha Mu, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Kappa Sigma, Lambda Chi Alpha, Tau Kappa Epsilon and Alpha Phi Omega.

The Charter Presentation

The charter presentation banquet, followed by a dance, was held at Beefeaters Inn in El Paso on Sunday, November 19. Earlier in the day the charter members were initiated into Alpha Kappa Lambda by members of Alpha Alpha Chapter at New Mexico State. Thirty seven men became charter members of Alpha Rho.

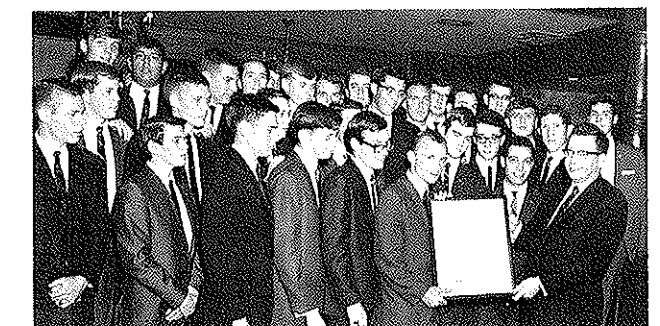
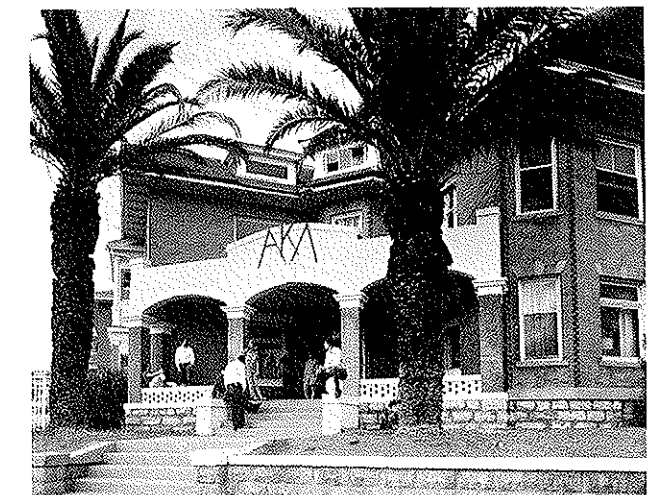
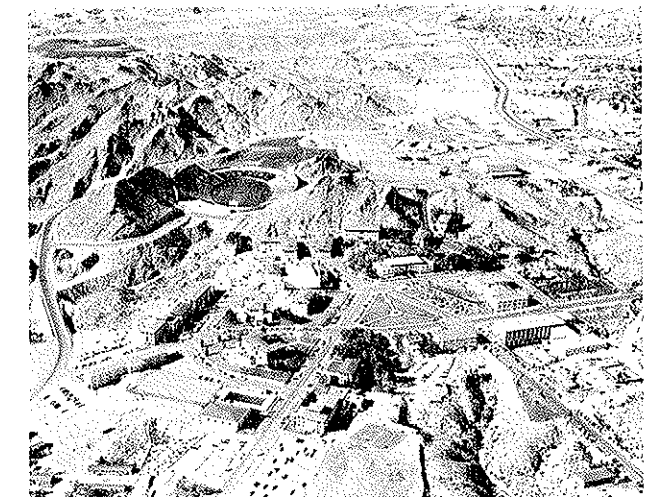
Robert Stuart, AKL National Vice President, gave an address at the banquet and officially presented the charter to the members of the new chapter. Official guests included Dr. Lewis Ray, President of the university; faculty advisors Dr. Lewis Hatch, Washington State '33, Dean of Arts and Sciences and Dr. John Richards, Kansas '55, Dean of the College of Business Administration; and representing the AKL National Headquarters: Lewis Bacon, National Executive Secretary and Ron Seibold, Jim Nutt and J. D. Snodgrass, staff representatives.

UNIVERSITY OF NEW MEXICO

A charter granted to the AKL Colony at The University of New Mexico was presented March 2, 1968. Alpha Sigma Chapter received its official declaration in ceremonies held at the Western Skies Motel in Albuquerque.

On November 6, 1966, thirteen men met at this same site where sixteen months later they were to attend the installation ceremonies of their chapter. Under the guidance of staff members from AKL National Headquarters the group began the task of building a fraternity organization and seeking members. At first, the new colony failed to make the gains its members hoped for. After a period of discouragement caused by unexpected difficulties, the members reevaluated their organization, renewed their efforts and determination and made dramatic

strides forward under the leadership of president Bill Camp. The colony completed its first year with 34 members, a sound fraternity organization and a dedication to common ideals and purpose.

The Installation

Initiation of the charter members of Alpha Sigma was conducted by members of Alpha Alpha Chapter at New Mexico State University and members of Alpha Rho at The University of Texas at El Paso. The installation banquet was held Saturday evening, March 2. The chartering address was given by AKL National President Alfred B. Post. President Post presented the Alpha Sigma charter to 18 charter members and 16 charter pledges. Gary Wilson, chapter president, accepted the charter on behalf of the members. Guests at the banquet included Howard V. Mathany, Dean of Men; William C. Naylor and Fred C. Reagan, Assistant Deans of Men; John E. Thorsen, President of the Student Body; Lewis Bacon, AKL National Executive Secretary; and AKL staff representatives.

The University

The University of New Mexico was created in 1889 by an act of the Territorial Legislature. The institution has grown from a summer normal school occupying one building on 20 acres of land to a major university housed in 79 buildings on 500 acres. Colleges of the university include: arts and sciences, education, engineering, pharmacy, law, business administration, nursing, fine arts, medicine, and a university college. New Mexico offers courses in 44 instructional departments and grants advanced degrees in 39 fields.

The university is situated in metropolitan Albuquerque on a plateau overlooking the Rio Grande River. The influence of Indian, Spanish and Mexican cultures is evidenced in the campus architecture and in course offerings and research in Latin American studies and regional anthro-

pology.

The New Mexico Greek system consists of 14 national fraternities and 10 national sororities. The Interfraternity Council has been actively seeking to expand the fraternity system at New Mexico.

ALLIANCE COLLEGE

An AKL Colony at Alliance College in Cambridge Springs, Pennsylvania was granted a charter as Alpha Tau Chapter of Alpha Kappa Lambda on April 20, 1968. The Installation ceremonies took place at the Franklin Club in Franklin, Pennsylvania.

Alpha Tau began in March, 1967 when Larry Bevington, an AKL from California State (Pa.), brought a group of men together to form the nucleus for an organization to seek affiliation with Alpha Kappa Lambda. The group met regularly all through the spring and began the fall term as a recognized campus local fraternity. The members were active on campus and held several offices including student council vice president and junior and senior class vice presidents.

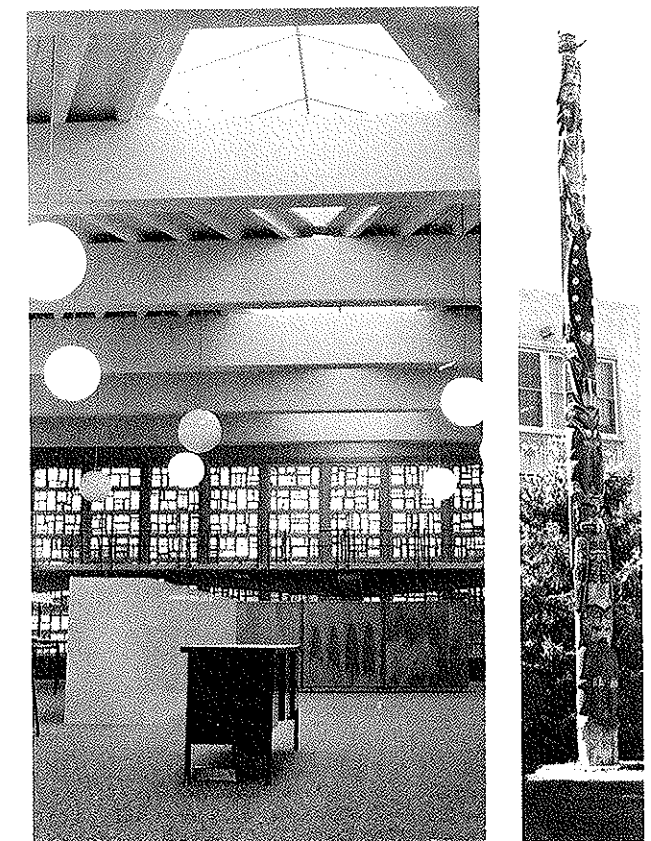
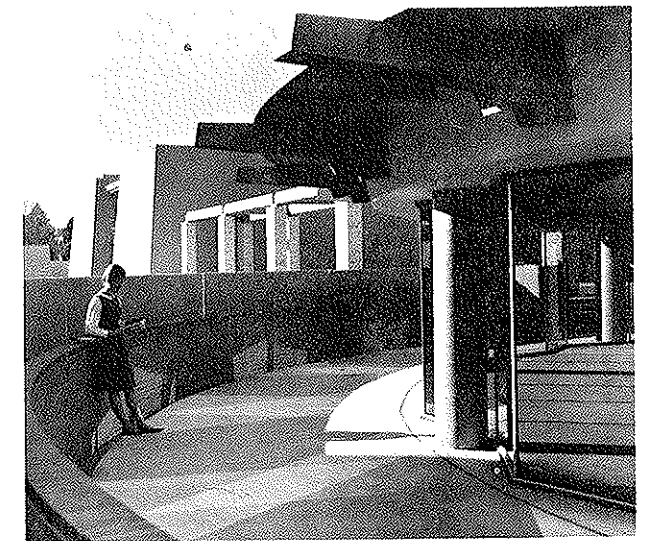
The colony secured an eleven room house near campus in April, 1967. The chapter house provided the young organization a needed base of operations and living space for 14 men.

The Charter Presentation

Installation ceremonies were conducted by E. T. Burroughs, Immediate Past President of AKL. He gave the main address at the chartering banquet and presented the Alpha Tau charter to the members of the colony.

Guests attending the ceremonies included faculty members Guy Ruzzier and Val Kuczaj, advisors who were instrumental in the development of the chapter. Also attending were Gary Maine, Dean of Students; Ron Seibold AKL

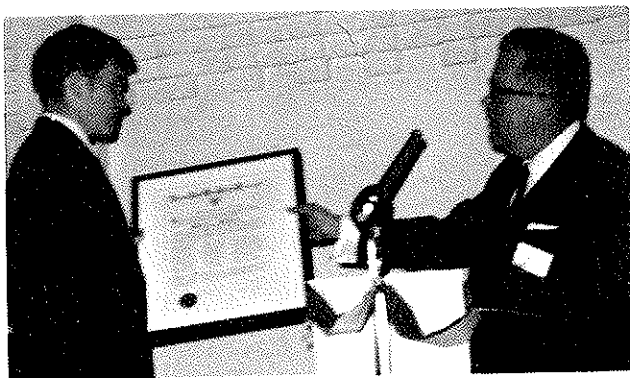

National Staff Representative; and several representatives of the Alliance faculty.

Alpha Tau Chapter is the third AKL chapter in Pennsylvania and the first national fraternity chapter to be installed at Alliance since 1959.

The College

Alliance College opened its doors for the first time as an academy in 1912. It was founded through the efforts of the educational commission and college fund of The Polish National Alliance, a fraternal organization for Americans of Polish descent. The order continues to provide the basic financial support for Alliance.

During World War I, Alliance participated in the effort to recreate a free and independent Poland. Two Polish units were trained on the campus for service with the Canadian Army. Ignacy Jan Paderewski delivered the 1916 commencement address during his successful campaign to restore Poland. After the war, Alliance cared for Polish refugees from Manchuria and Siberia.

Alliance became a degree granting, co-educational college in 1948 and a full accredited four year college in 1952. Recent growth of the college has been rapid. A projected enrollment of 1,200 will be accommodated by the addition of several new buildings now under construction or in the planning. They include a science building, two dormitories, a student union, a gymnasium and several others.

In addition to AKL, the Alliance fraternity system has three other national chapters, Sigma Tau Gamma, Tau Kappa Epsilon and Pi Lambda Phi.

NEBRASKA WESLEYAN UNIVERSITY

AKL's first chapter in the state of Nebraska was chartered at Nebraska Wesleyan University April 21, 1968. Thirty-six charter members and

four charter pledges became Alpha Upsilon Chapter in ceremonies held at the Lincoln Hotel in Lincoln.

Phi Sigma Rho local fraternity was founded April 8, 1966. Six men formed the original group, with the encouragement of the university, in order to strengthen and improve the fraternity system at N.W.U. Under the leadership of Steve Bell a house was rented, remodeled and furnished and occupied in the summer 1966. During its first year the group developed its social and activity programs and maintained a high grade average.

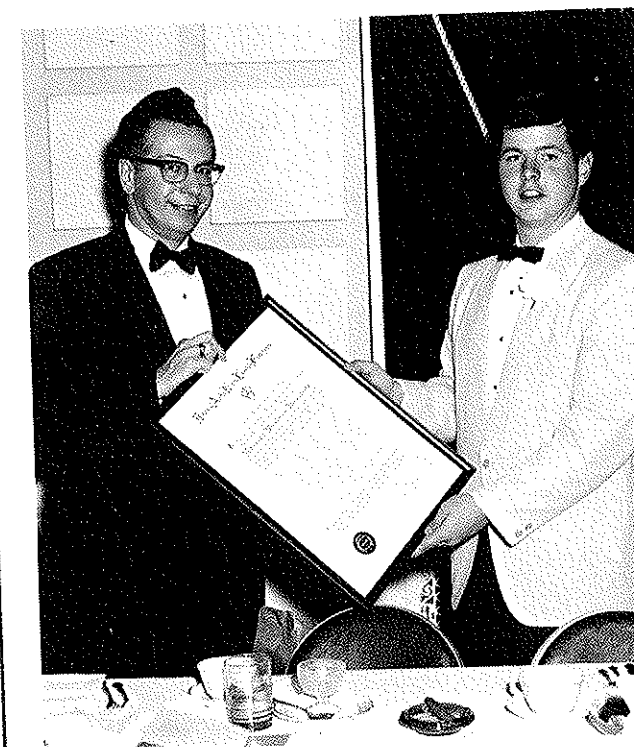
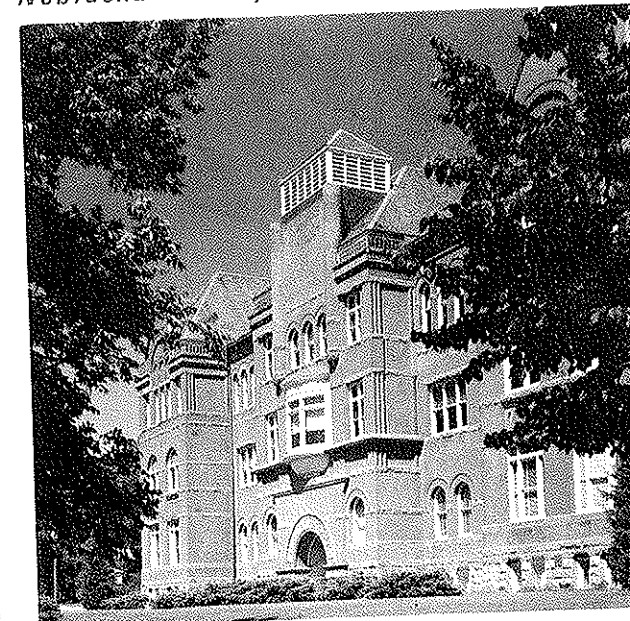
In May, 1967, the members felt their growth and organizational goals called for increased leadership. They voted to seek affiliation with AKL and were soon granted status as a colony. The colony secured a lease on the present chapter house adjacent to the university campus. The members have established a good record in scholarship, campus activities and leadership.

The University

Nebraska Wesleyan University is a Methodist-affiliated, private, liberal arts college, founded in 1888. It is located on a 44 acre campus in suburban northeast Lincoln. Its stated academic objectives are: (1) to inspire lasting and effective intellectual curiosity, (2) to stimulate an intellectual awareness of individual and group responsibility to society, (3) to deepen the appreciation of a great cultural heritage, and (4) to provide terminal and pre-professional courses designed as preparation for useful and responsible vocations.

Enrollment at N.W.U. is 1,369. There are thirty buildings in the campus complex including nine fraternity and sorority houses all located within a block of campus. Other members of the fraternity system are Phi Kappa Tau, Tau Kappa Epsilon, Theta Chi and Zeta Psi.

The Installation

AKL's from Iota Chapter at Kansas State and Alpha Zeta Chapter at N. W. Missouri conducted initiation ceremonies for the 36 charter members of Alpha Upsilon Sunday afternoon, April 21. That evening 170 persons attended the charter presentation banquet and installation ball at the Lincoln Hotel. National Vice President Robert Stuart gave the main address and presented the charter to the new chapter. Accepting for the members was John Charles, chapter president. Guests included Dr. Vance Rogers, President of Nebraska Wesleyan; Giles Lowden, President of IFC; Miss Ethel Johnson, Dean of Women; Dr. Milton Evans, Dean of Student Affairs; and Lewis Bacon, AKL National Executive Secretary.

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO

Alpha Kappa Lambda's fortieth active chapter and the first in the state of Idaho was installed at The University of Idaho May 11, 1968. The newest chapter, Alpha Phi, received its official charter during ceremonies held at the Idaho Student Union in Moscow, Idaho.

Thirty-three charter members were initiated into the fraternity by members of Eta Chapter at Washington State and Alpha Xi at Montana. After the formal initiation held Saturday afternoon, the members and about seventy-five guests attended the charter presentation banquet at the Student Union followed by an installation ball.

AKL National President Alfred B. Post presented the Alpha Phi charter and delivered the evening's main address. Accepting the charter for the chapter was Chris Smith, president. Guests at the banquet included Gary Tye, AKL National Chapter Service Secretary, university officials, student leaders and parents and friends of the members.

Conceived during the 1966-67 college year, the Idaho AKL Colony actually began actively organizing in the fall of 1967 under the leadership of Chris Smith. The members made rapid progress in all areas and soon had a membership of 30. Their objectives included bringing a new spirit of innovation in group living and establishing new programs and ideas to improve the quality of fraternity life at Idaho. During the year the colony rented a house near the campus.

Dewey Newman, Associate Dean of Students, said of the colony, "I feel that the group has made the most startling progress in a short time of any fraternity to come on campus in recent years."

The University of Idaho Greek system consists of seventeen national fraternities and nine national sororities.

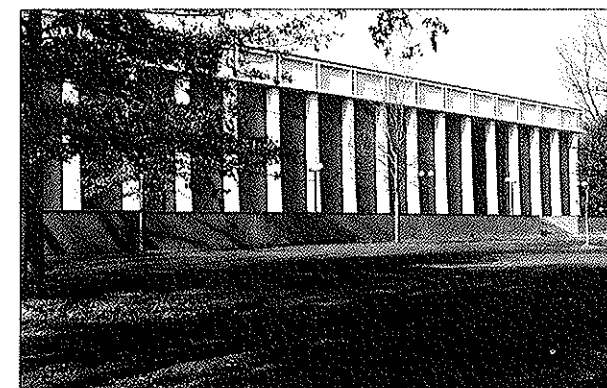
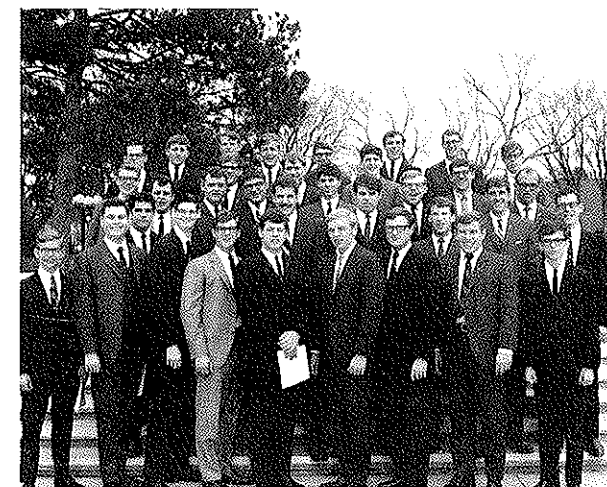
The University

Six thousand students attend The University of Idaho located in the city of Moscow. The university is organized into eight colleges and a graduate school and constitutes the major institution in the state's system of higher education. Founded in 1892, Idaho occupies a campus totaling approximately 1,450 acres which includes an 800 acre experimental farm. Among the campus complex of buildings and facilities valued at \$42 million are 26 fraternity and sorority owned residences. New construction under way or proposed amounts to \$14 million.

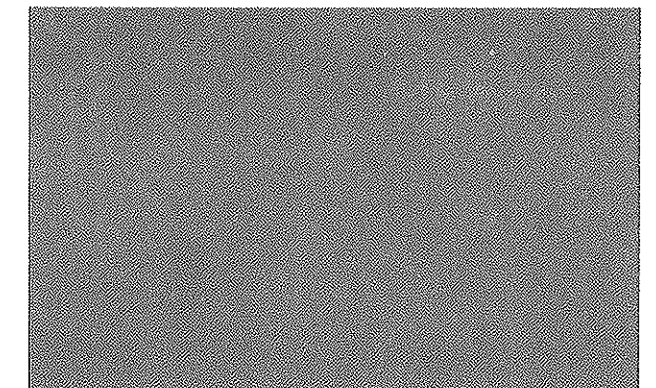
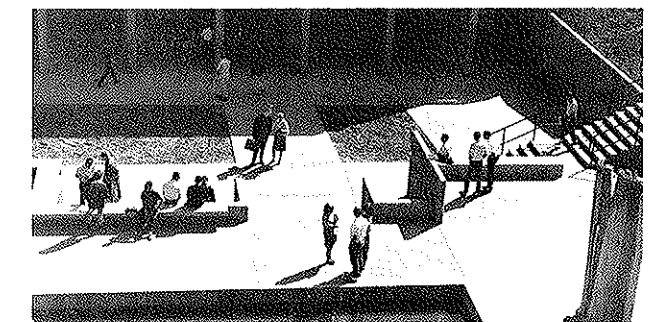
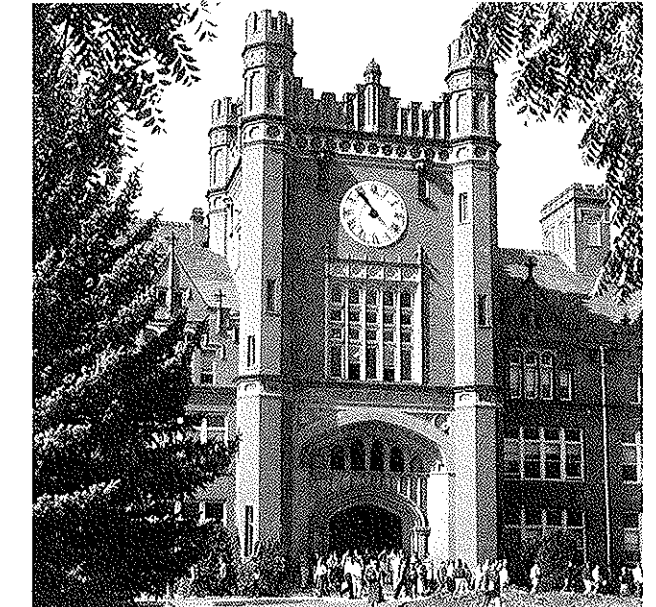
Recent additions to the university's facilities include the student union, dormitories, library building, classroom buildings and now under construction, a performing arts center.

The University of Idaho is a land grant institution. It was established by the Territorial Legislature and is older than the state itself, its founding having preceded Idaho's admission to statehood by six months.

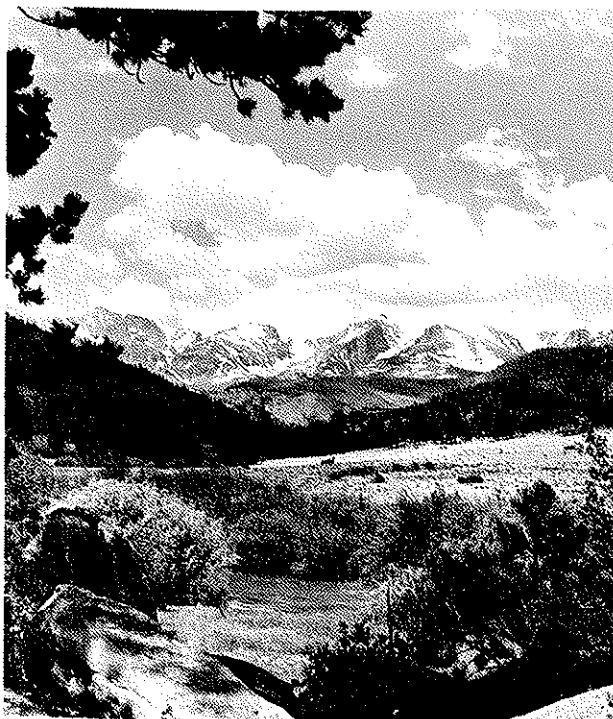

WHEN AND WHERE

The National Leadership College will be held on the campus of Colorado State College, Greeley, beginning the afternoon of Wednesday, August 28, and ending after lunch Friday, August 30. All AKL's are invited and urged to attend the 24th National Conclave in the historic Stanley Hotel in Estes Park. Each collegiate chapter has two votes and each alumni chapter has one vote. All members can participate fully in the Conclave, but only the two chosen delegates from each chapter can cast votes.

The Reverend Gail Cleland, California '09, will be the principal speaker at the Honors Banquet of the AKL National Conclave, Saturday evening, August 31, at the Stanley Hotel in Estes Park, Colorado.

Dr. Cleland, with ten other students at the University of California in 1907, formed Los Amigos, the house club which became Alpha Kappa Lambda in 1914. After serving three years (1911-1914) as professor of English at Japan's Tohoku Imperial University he became Pastor of The Congregational Church in Concord, Mass. While there he studied at Harvard and Boston universities, receiving a Ph.D. in philosophy from Boston in 1924.

As an army chaplain in both W.W.I and W.W.II he rose from lieutenant to full colonel and served as Gen. MacArthur's Chief of the Bureau of Public Opinion in Korea.

In 1936, he was a press representative to the Olympic Games in Berlin where he saw Jesse Owens' record breaking performance before Adolph Hitler. He accurately predicted the world crisis which soon followed.

From 1929 to 1941, Dr. Cleland was Pastor of the First Congregational Church in Alameda, California. He retired last year after 15 years as Associate Minister of The First Congregational Church in San Francisco.

CHAPTER HOUSING

A CURRENT REPORT



Probably the most dramatic and visible signs of AKL growth and stability over the past few years have been in the area of chapter housing. Chapter houses completed in the last eight years are valued well into the millions of dollars. Seventeen of the 40 AKL chapters are housed in facilities built since 1960, and several more houses are in the planning or under construction.

Most of this housing was made possible by the AKL National Housing Program, which has been successful in soliciting private investment for fraternity house construction. Equally important has been the effort of chapter corporations in fund raising and administration.

Presented here are some pictures and descriptions of the three most recently completed chapter houses.

PSI Chapter, Iowa State

The Psi house is a three story red brick colonial structure housing 58 men. The lower level contains the living room which is furnished in the Spanish Mediterranean style. It is carpeted and has a large fireplace. Also on this level are the housemother's quarters, a recreation room with a pool table, the kitchen and the dining room which seats 60.

The upper two levels consist of two man sleep-study rooms equipped with bunks, desks and wardrobe space.

Alpha Nu Chapter, Washburn

AKL's at Washburn now occupy a contemporary house with a brick and natural wood exterior. The front section consists of a two-story social and recreation area. The upper level houses the chapter and recreation rooms. Below them are the living room, kitchen and dining area.

The rear section of the house contains two man sleep-study rooms accommodating 52 men on three floors. The housemother's suite is also in this section.

Special features include carpeting throughout, including the dining room, interior brick walls in the social area and Italian Mediterranean decor.

Alpha Lambda, Northern Illinois

Alpha Lambda's house is a three story dark brick contemporary design with a sunken patio entrance. The lower level contains a carpeted, Spanish Mediterranean furnished formal lounge with a large brick fireplace. Also on this level are the houseparents' quarters, an informal lounge, kitchen and large dining room.

The upper two floors contain large two man sleep-study rooms with capacity for 60 men. Each room has two bunks, desks, large wardrobe space and a telephone.

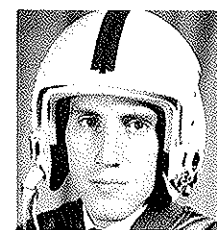

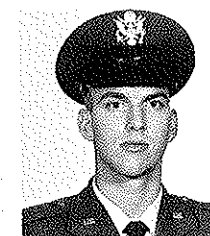

The national officers of Acacia Fraternity voted unanimously on March 24 to move the fraternity's national headquarters from Evanston, Illinois to Boulder, Colorado.

FRANK B. LENZ died at the age of 79 on January 4, 1968 in Tampa, Florida after a short illness. Brother Lenz was a founder of Alpha Chapter and a winner of the Distinguished Service Award, AKL's highest honor.
